SHAY TERRICK GUNAIKURNAI LAND AND WATERS ABORIGINAL CORPORATION

Shay is a proud Gunaikurnai man, born and raised in Lakes Entrance. He lives for his family—his wife and three daughters, whom he adores.

Shay proudly works at Gunaikurnai Land and Waters Aboriginal Corporation, established in 2007 as the Registered Aboriginal Party representing the Gunaikurnai people, the Traditional Owners of Country, as determined by the Victorian Aboriginal Heritage Council under the Aboriginal Heritage Act, 2006. He has held a number of roles including GLaWAC On Country Ranger, Joint Management Manager, and Cultural Education Officer.

"My culture is my passion and gives me strength. Understanding where I come from, appreciating where I am now, and knowing where I want to be. I am privileged by the knowledge handed down to me by my Elders and have the utmost respect for their journey. I hope to make my Elders proud as I continue my own journey of learning about my culture and sharing my knowledge. However, I feel I have only just scratched the surface.

The Gunaikurnai community is proud of how we represent and include the mob in achieving broad respect for our culture, protecting and healing our land, and working towards genuine economic independence."

KIM KEEN KINAWAY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Kim is the Government Relationships Manager at Kinaway Chamber of Commerce, the peak body representing certified Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses in Victoria. The word Kinaway is from the Gunaikurnai language meaning 'exchange'.

Our focus is on changing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's lives through a strength-based model of business ownership and participation in the Victorian economy.

Kinaway Chamber of Commerce is an established charity with the purpose of advancing Victorian Aboriginal businesses to actively participate and excel in both national and international economies.

RICHARD BELFORD MANY RIVERS

Richard is the Regional Manager (Vic/Tas) for Many Rivers, a forpurpose organisation that provides microenterprise development and community economic development support to Indigenous and other Australians who want to access the economy, however, for various reasons, lack the financial or practical business support to do so.

Many Rivers purpose is to walk alongside individuals and communities over the long term, offering accessible business development support, products and services, including pro-bono legal advice and microfinance business loans.

With this support individuals and communities can regain control of their financial future, reduce personal stress, move away from welfare dependency, provide for their families and contribute more productively to society i.e. producing goods and services, income, jobs and financial security.

DAY 2: KEYNOTE SPEAKER



BRIAN STEVENS WARIGA MOLLA

Proudly hailing from Orbost in East Gippsland, Brian Stevens is a distinguished Gunai man with over 30 years of expertise in Aboriginal community leadership and governance. His extensive career is firmly embedded in a deep cultural understanding, guided by Aboriginal community protocols and values, which he applies across diverse sectors and managerial roles.

Brian has honed exceptional skills in governance, corporate planning, change management, and program design through his longstanding career. His expertise spans across strategic planning, community development, and leadership training, always with a focus on building cultural competency and engagement.

As the founder of Brian Stevens Consulting (trading as Wariga Molla), which has been successfully operating for over 13 years, Brian provides tailored consultancy services to a wide array of clients. His work focuses on leadership development, business growth, community engagement, and professional mentoring and coaching.

Respected as a leader in his field, Brian has made significant contributions to government policies and strategies via various Board roles that promote Indigenous leadership, economic development, Aboriginal health, arts and cultural tourism. His commitment to culturally appropriate management practices is reflected in his work on cultural awareness, competency, and safety training.

DAY 2: ABORIGINAL BUSINESS PANEL SESSION

MICK HARDING NGARGA WARENDJ

Ngarga Warendj which means dancing wombat produces high quality contemporary Indigenous Art, using designs based on traditional symbols from South-East Australia. As a member of the Taungurung people Mick draws upon his Aboriginal heritage in his artwork. From woodwork and sculpture to printmaking and giftwares, his designs showcase Indigenous art in a contemporary style.

FIONA SORENSON SORENSON CLEANING & SUPPORT PTY LTD

Sorensen Cleaning was founded in 2019 by Fiona and her family. The business was created when Fiona realised there was a space in the Latrobe Valley for an Aboriginal owned and run cleaning company. On top of this Fiona already had experience working as a commercial cleaner, so it was the perfect fit for Fiona to start her own cleaning business.

In a short amount of time Sorensen Cleaning grew to include staff members to be able to keep up with the cleaning demand. Shortly after, the services Fiona and her crew offered grew from cleaning services to include community access support and other small house hold jobs.

NIGEL PEARCE PEARCE CAMERON CONTRACTORS PTY LTD

An Indigenous business working in the Landscaping and Environmental sector. Pearce Cameron Contractors, who recently celebrated 2 years in business, is based in Bairnsdale and is a registered Indigenous company that has a strong key objective of providing meaningful training and employment opportunities to Indigenous people.

LIONEL DUKAKIS FIRST NATIONS TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

First Nations Traffic Management are leaders in Traffic Control across NSW and Victoria. They have been creating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander jobs and careers in the construction industry for major projects throughout Victoria since 2019 and New South Wales from 2023.
